TOSS-UP ROUND

Question 1

You can't open a game of chess with a queen or a rook. In fact, there are only two pieces that can legally open a game of chess. For ten points, name both of those pieces.

ANSWER: pawn AND knight

Question 2

In 1964 Forrest and Fuzzy Raffle, the Raffle Brothers started a fast food chain to compete with chains such as McDonalds and Burger King. They wanted to call their restaurants "Big Tex", but that was already a registered trademark of another restaurant. They kept the western theme, though, and sixty years later the chain continues to use a cowboy hat logo. For ten points, name this restaurant chain.

ANSWER: Arby's

Question 3

While coffee is mainly grown in the tropics, the highest rates of coffee drinking are in much colder climates. In fact the country that drinks the most coffee per capita is a European Union member that extends north of the Arctic Circle. For ten points, name this country that was home to composer Jean Sibelius (zhan su-BEE-lee-us).

ANSWER: Finland

Question 4

For most of the 20th Century hurricanes were only give women's names. The first male name was given to the second hurricane in 1979, and since then names have alternated between feminine and masculine names. For ten points, give this three-letter name that was the first men's name given to a hurricane.

ANSWER: Bob

Question 5

As of 2024 the two largest cities that are not connected to the interstate highway system both lie in California's central valley, between half an hour and an hour's drive from Interstate 5. There have been proposals to re-number California highway 99 to become Interstate 7 and serve these cities. For ten points, name either of these cities between Los Angeles and Sacramento, each of which has about half a million people.

ANSWER: Bakersfield OR Fresno

Question 6

In 2024 he was charged with drunk driving in New York after veering out of a lane and running a stop sign. For ten points name this popular music star.

ANSWER: Justin Timberlake

Question 7

This ray-finned fish is found in coastal waters around the world. One variety can also be called the goatfish. For ten points, name this type of fish that shares its name with a hairstyle.

ANSWER: mullet

Question 8

Following the custom of the Egyptian royal family, Cleopatra's husband Ptolemy V (TALL-uh-me the fifth) was related to her in a different way besides husband. For ten points, what family member did Cleopatra marry?

ANSWER: her brother

Question 9

For ten points, in rowing, how many oars are used in a double scull?

ANSWER: 4

Question 10

Tennessee is landlocked, because it has no coastline. Utah is double landlocked, because all the states that border it are landlocked. There is only one triple landlocked state in the United States, meaning that to reach the ocean you would have to travel through at least three other states or Canadian provinces. For ten points, name the only triple landlocked state.

ANSWER: Nebraska

Question 11

Most people know that the adjective canine refers to dogs and feline refers to cats. For ten points, what animal does asinine refer to?

ANSWER: donkey (ask for clarification on “ass”)

Question 12

The second most sleepy animal is the sloth, which sleeps around twenty hours each day. The most sleepy animal spends about 22 hours a day sleeping. For ten points, name that animal.

ANSWER: koala

Question 13

Europeans often deride the doors on American public toilets for providing very little privacy. The large gaps under American toilet doors were designed to be easy to clean under. For ten points, name the architect who designed the side-hung toilet door, which was first used in 1904 in the Larkin Soap Building in Buffalo, New York.

ANSWER: Frank Lloyd Wright

Question 14

None of these animals have been spotted in the wild in Michigan since 2004. Nevertheless it continues to be the state animal of Michigan and is also the mascot of the largest university in the state. For ten points, name this animal.

ANSWER: Wolverine

Question 15

For ten points, Bolivia has a desert named after what 20th Century Spanish surrealist artist?

ANSWER: Salvador Dali

Question 16

This word first referred to sword-wielding mercenaries who would fight for whoever paid them the most. The word appears in Sir Walter Scott's *Ivanhoe* in which a character uses the word for a paid army of sword-wielding soldiers that he assembled. Today the term refers to someone who works on an ad hoc basis, rather than being paid by a single company. For ten points, give the term.

ANSWER: freelance OR freelancer

Question 17

For ten points, Elton John's song "Empty Garden" was written as a tribute to what other musician?

ANSWER: John Lennon

Question 18

For ten points, which women's beauty brand derives its name from the Latin word for "snow"?

ANSWER: Nivea

Question 19

A bear in the London Zoo was named after this Canadian city. That bear inspired author A.A. Milne to write his famous series of books about a teddy bear. If you go to the Canadian city, you can find a statue of the bear that is featured in such books as *The House at Pooh Corner*. For ten points, name the city.

ANSWER: Winnipeg, Manitoba

Question 20

The best-selling country music song of all time was recorded by Johnny Cash in 1956. For ten points name this song that Cash wrote as a pledge of devotion to his newlywed wife.

ANSWER: "I Walk the Line"

Question 21

In 2024 the *Washington Post* sought to determine the most “normal” state in America. They compiled U.S. Census data in thirty socioeconomic categories such as race, religion, income, education, and jobs and found that this state was closest to the U.S. as a whole in every category. For ten points, name the most normal state, which happens to have a state university located in the city of “Normal”.

ANSWER: Illinois

Question 22

After inventing his famous cube, how long did it take Erno Rubik to solve it. For ten points, did it take him one minute, one hour, one day, one month, or one year?

ANSWER: one month

Question 23

For ten points, Robert Frost said that good what make good neighbors?

ANSWER: good fences

Question 24

For ten points, how many syllables are in a complete stanza of a haiku poem?

ANSWER: 17 (5 each in the first and last lines, and seven in the middle)

Question 25

For ten points, what European country receives more visitors each year than any other nation on earth?

ANSWER: France

(Continue to the bonus round.)

Toss-Up 26

After Tennessee seceded from the Union, this man fled the state but continued to represent it in the United States Senate. For ten points, name this man who later became Vice President and then President of the United States?

ANSWER: Andrew Johnson (prompt for more information on “Johnson”)

For five points each, identify these pairs of countries.

Part 1

Two countries in Europe begin with the letter “P” in English. Name them.

ANSWER: Poland AND Portugal

Part 2

Two countries in Africa begin with the letter “Z” in English. Name those two countries.

ANSWER: Zambia AND Zimbabwe

Part 3

Two countries in South America begin with the letter “C” in English. Name those two countries.

ANSWER: Chile AND Colombia

Part 4

Two countries in Asia begin with the letter “N” in English. Name those countries.

ANSWER: Nepal AND North Korea

Part 5

Two countries in Oceania begin with the letter “T” in English. Name those countries.

ANSWER: Tonga AND Tuvalu

The 1960s group Simon and Garfunkel had a hit with the song “Scarborough Fair”. This song’s subtitle is four spices that are often used in cooking. For ten points, name those spices.

ANSWER: parsley, sage, rosemary AND thyme (does not need to be in that order)

Angst – a feeling of anxiety or depression

ANSWER: A – N – G – S – T

Part 2

Kitsch – a style that is gaudy, garish, or tacky

ANSWER: K – I – T – S – C – H

Part 3

Kohlrabi (coal-ROB-ee) – a vegetable in the cabbage family

ANSWER: K – O – H – L – R – A – B – I

Part 4

Schnauzer – a breed of dog

ANSWER: S – C – H – N – A – U – Z – E – R

Part 5

Carabiner (care-uh-BEAN-er) – a safety hook used by rock climbers

ANSWER: C – A – R – A – B – I – N – E – R

Toss-Up 29

The two most distant U.S. state capitals are Honolulu and Augusta, which are 5,119 miles apart. For ten points, name the two closest state capitals, which are just 41 miles apart.

ANSWER: Boston AND Providence

Bonus 29

Consider the four countries that make up the United Kingdom: England, Scotland, Wales, and Northern Ireland. Now consider these four animals: the dragon, the lion, the red deer, and the unicorn. For twenty-five points (all or nothing) match the four U.K. countries with their national animals.

ANSWER: England ↔ lion (all four must be correct for 25 points)
Scotland ↔ unicorn
Wales ↔ dragon
Northern Ireland ↔ red deer

Toss-Up 30

This word means “peninsula” in Arabic, and it is the name of both a peninsula and a mountain located there. In Hebrew the same word means “hatred” or “jealousy”, which is thought to have come from outsiders’ jealousy of Jews receiving the law of God. For ten points, name this part of Egypt that is separated from the continent of Africa by the Suez Canal.

ANSWER: Sinai

Bonus 30

For five points each, identify these Shakespeare plays.

Part 1

The musical *West Side Story* is a modern adaptation of which play?

ANSWER: *Romeo and Juliet*

Part 2

Which play has a monologue that includes the line “to be or not to be”?

ANSWER: *Hamlet*

Part 3

Which play’s title refers to the Feast of the Epiphany?

ANSWER: *Twelfth Night*

Part 4

Shakespeare’s earliest plays are thought to be the trilogy about what king?

ANSWER: *Henry VI (the sixth)*

Part 5

Shakespeare’s shortest play, this farce deals with twin sons who are unaware of each other’s existence.

ANSWER: *A Comedy of Errors*

Toss-Up 31

For ten points, what famous scientist appeared in the first logo used by the tech giant Apple?

ANSWER: Isaac **Newton**

Bonus 31

The poem "Monday's Child" was recorded as "traditional" in 19th Century British magazines and theoretically tells the fortunes of children born on different days of the week. It begins with the line "Monday's child is fare of face." For five points each tell the day of the week on which the poem says children with these characteristics are born.

ANSWER: hydrogen

Part 2

Named after the Norse God of thunder

ANSWER: thorium

Part 3

Comes from the Latin name for France

ANSWER: gallium

Part 4

Comes from an Indo-European root meaning “yellow”

ANSWER: gold

Part 5

Comes from a Greek root meaning “strange” or “foreign”

ANSWER: xenon
